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
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

B.A. students can complete up to 12 credits (with approval of the graduate coordinator) of M.S. courses during their senior year. These courses count as electives toward the B.A. The remaining 21 credits required for the M.S. can be completed in as few as 15 months following graduation with the B.A.

Justification for starting a combined degree program: SCCJ is interested in recruiting and retaining our top undergraduate students. One advantage of our School is that we offer both research and teaching assistantships at the graduate level making us a competitive option for an advanced degree. A combined B.A./M.S. program would add to our competitiveness by offering an accelerated degree program. This program would also help improve undergrad alumni education and employment statistics meeting the State and University goals of institutional effectiveness. This would be consistent with the State's push for a 4-year education instead of the 6-year evaluation period we currently have.

Admission Requirements and Academic Standing

1. Applications to the advanced standing program may be submitted by students by the end of their junior year of study and no later than July 1. Applicants must have no academic deficiencies at the time of application.
2. Applicants must have a minimum undergraduate FAU GPA of 3.5 in order to be admitted to the program.
3. Students must provide a letter of intent, a letter of recommendation from a professor, as well as a strong academic writing sample.
4. It is strongly recommended that Criminology and Methods of Research be completed *prior* to starting the B.A./M.S. advanced degree program. At a minimum, Methods of Research (CCJ 4700) should be IN PROGRESS by the time the student applies for the program. Criminology (CCJ 3014) and Ethics and the Justice System (CCJ 4054) must be completed BEFORE the spring of a student's senior year.
5. Continued involvement in the B.A./M.S. program is contingent upon good academic standing in both programs. This includes maintenance of an overall 3.0 cumulative GPA in the Master's program. Student progress will be evaluated every semester. Students who do not maintain good academic standing in both programs and/or who drop below the required 3.0 overall GPA in the Master's program may be placed on academic probation during the semester immediately following the one in which their cumulative GPA dropped below 3.0. Failure to regain a 3.0 cumulative GPA within two successive semesters thereafter results in dismissal from the program. Students may also be dismissed at any time that they are not making satisfactory progress toward completion of the degree, or for serious violations of academic integrity.
