Withdrawals

Grade Appeal Process

A student may request a review of the final course grade when s/he believes that one of the following conditions apply:

- There was a computational or recording error in the grading.
- Non-academic criteria were applied in the grading process.
- There was a gross violation of the instructor's own grading system.
- The procedures for a grade appeal may be found in <u>Chapter 4 of the University Regulations.</u>
